Kuzushiji Workshop with Prof. Aratake Kenichirō

18.07.2016 - 23.07.2016

The Institute of Japanese Studies is pleased to announce a "Kuzushiji Workshop" with Professor Aratake Kenichirō of Tōhoku University (Northeast Asia Center).

Outline

We invite applicants who are interested in print and manuscript materials from the Edo and Meiji periods. Both students and faculty are welcome. Knowledge of classical Japanese or of cursive writing is not mandatory. Participants will be offered an introduction to the techniques necessary for working with handwritten documents or texts printed in cursive characters. The workshop aims at enabling participants to read material written in *kuzushiji* and to transpose them into presently used characters. As an additional effect we hope that our meeting will serve as an international platform of exchange for those interested in the writing and printing culture of Edo period Japan and that it will offer an incentive for joint projects in the future.

Program

The workshop will take place on five days from Monday to Friday, both in the morning and in the afternoon. The third day will be reserved for a visit to the "Museum Angewandte Kunst" (Museum of Applied Arts) and its beautiful collection of *Nara ehon* and *ukiyoe* single sheet prints. Also, participants will be introduced to the collection of Edo period printed books held by the Institute of Japanese Studies (*Edo bunko*). In the evenings, individual meetings with Prof. Aratake offer the chance to talk about individual projects and problems encountered while working with *kuzushiji* texts.

The sixth and final day is reserved for small presentations by the participants to introduce their projects and to discuss them with the larger audience.

Participation

The workshop is open to faculty as well as to students who are interested in handwritten sources or texts printed in cursive characters. Knowledge of *bungo* and of historical scripts (including what imprecisely is sometimes called *hentaigana*) is not mandatory. However, knowledge of modern spoken and written Japanese is required since the workshop will be conducted in Japanese.

The number of participants is limited to a maximum of 20 persons. Course materials will be uploaded on the OLAT platform used by Frankfurt University (a guest account for external participants will be opened after successfully applying for workshop participation). The Institute of Japanese Studies will support participants in finding accommodation for the duration of the workshop.
